Covid-19 is an illness that can affect your lungs and airways. The virus is now known as the severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2). The disease it causes is called coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19). In March 2020, the World Health Organization (WHO) declared the COVID-19 outbreak a pandemic. Data has shown that it spreads from person to person among those in close contact (within about 6 feet, or 2 meters). The virus spreads by respiratory droplets released when someone with the virus coughs, sneezes or talks. These droplets can be inhaled or land in the mouth or nose of a person nearby.

It can also spread if a person touches a surface with the virus on it and then touches his or her mouth, nose or eyes, although this isn't considered to be a main way it spreads.

Symptoms can be mild, moderate, severe, or fatal. The risk to children themselves of becoming severely ill from coronavirus (COVID-19) is very low. In addition, there is no evidence that children transmit the disease any more than adults.

We are aware of this disease and are vigilant as to any of our pupils, staff, volunteers or visitors displaying symptoms.

This risk assessment was initially prepared on the 30th August 2020 in line with government guidelines for the re-start of schools in September and is applicable to private schools, and will be an on-going assessment as and when there are changes to Covid-19 Government guidelines.

	 In line with current government guidance, face coverings are now required to be worn in the classroom, for year 7 and above. Each teaching area has their own risk assessment. If 2 m spacings can be maintained, then masks may be removed. Some individuals are exempt from wearing face coverings. This applies to those who cannot put on, wear or remove a face covering because of a physical or mental illness or impairment or disability All pupils, staff, volunteers and visitors should provide their own face covering but, where they are unable to use their face covering due to having forgotten it or it having become soiled or unsafe, a small contingency supply will be available. These can be found in Houses, Main reception and Lower School reception. Safe wearing of face coverings requires cleaning of hands before and after touching – including to remove or put them on – and the safe storage of them in individual, sealable plastic bags between use. Track and trace	Tracing close contacts and isolation Close contacts in schools are now identified by NHS Test and Trace and education settings are no longer expected to undertake contact tracing. As with positive cases in any other setting, NHS Test and Trace will work with the positive case or their parent to identify close contacts. Contacts from a school setting will only be traced by NHS Test and Trace where the positive case or their parent specifically identifies the individual as being a close contact. This is likely to be a small number of individuals who would be most at risk of contracting COVID-19 due to the nature of the close contact. School may be contacted in exceptional cases to help with identifying close contacts. Adults who are fully vaccinated and all children and young people aged between 5 and 18 years and 6 months identified as a contact of someone with COVID-19 are strongly advised to take a LFD test every day for 7 days and continue to attend their setting as normal, unless they have a positive test result. Daily testing of close contacts applies to all contacts who are: • fully vaccinated adults — people who have had 2 doses of an approved vaccine • all children and young people aged 5 to 18 years and 6 months, regardless of their vaccination status • people who are not able to get vaccinated for medical reasons • people taking part, or have taken part, in an approved clinical trial for a COVID-19 vaccine Children under 5 years are exempt from self-isolation and do not need to take part in daily testing of close contacts. 18-year-olds will be treated in the same way as children until 6 months after their 18th birthday, to allow them the opportunity to get fully vaccinated. At which point, they will be subject to the same rules as adults and so if they choose not to get vaccinated, they will need to self-isolate if identified as a close contact. COVID 19 and Isolation	If you are fully vaccinated, or below 18 years 6 months, and you live in the same household as someone with COVID-19 (or are identified as being a close contact by NHS Track and Trace) you are not legally required to self-isolate and should attend school. However, you should take an LFD test every day for 7 days, and to self-isolate if any of these test results is positive. If you have COVID-19 symptoms you should stay at home and self-isolate immediately. You should arrange to have a PCR test as soon as possible. If this PCR test result is positive, you must continue to self-isolate. If you do not have COVID-19 symptoms, but you have a positive PCR or LFD test result, you must stay at home and self-isolate. You can return to your normal routine and stop self-isolating after 10 full days if your symptoms have gone. You may be able to end your self-isolation period before the end of the 10 full days. You can take an LFD test from 6 days after the day your symptoms started (or the day your test was taken if you did not have symptoms), and another LFD test on the following day. The second LFD test should be taken at least 24 hours later. If both these test results are negative, and you do not have a high temperature, you may end your self-isolation after the second negative test result. To further reduce the chance of passing COVID-19 on to others, if you end your self-isolation period before 10 full days you should: Ilimit close contact with other people outside your household maintain 2m social distancing (if not possible, limit the time) wear a face covering when in school (indoors) at all times exercise enhanced hand hygiene You should follow this advice until 10 full days from when your self-isolation period started. If you are isolating because of a positive test result but did not have any symptoms, and you develop COVID-19 symptoms within your isolation period, start a new isolation period from the day your symptoms start. What is meant by a contact A contact is a person who has been close to someone who has tested positive for COVID-19. You can be a contact any time from 2 days before the person who tested positive developed their symptoms (or, if they did not have any symptoms, from 2 days before the date their positive test was taken), and up to 10 days after, as this is when they can pass the infection on to others. A risk assessment may be undertaken to determine this, but a contact can be: anyone who lives in the same household as another person who has COVID-19 symptoms or has tested positive for COVID-19 anyone who has had any of the following types of contact with someone who has tested positive for COVID-19: face-to-face contact including being coughed on or having a face-to-face conversation within one metre been within one metre for one minute or longer without face-to-face contact been within 2 metres of someone for more than 15 minutes (either as a one-off contact, or added up together over one day) 	Y	All Staff and parents	02/09/2020 23/08/2021 13/10/2021

Appendix 3 Staff Guidance on dealing with a suspected COVID-19 case at Ellesmere College Main COVID-19 Symptoms • a high temperature – this means you feel hot to touch on your chest of back (you do not need to measure your temperature) • a new, continuous cough – this means coughing a lot for more than an hour, or 3 or more coughing episodes in 24 hours (if you usually have a cough, it may be worse than usual) • a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste – this means you've noticed you cannot smell or taste anything, or things smell or taste different to normal. **DAYTIME** 1. In House: Isolate pupil in their room, making sure no roommates are present. Ring Sickbay on 01691 626 529 or mobile 07531 801 558 for advice and further instructions. You can also go on the NHS has an online symptom checker, https://111.nhs.uk/covid-19/ 2. **In Class**: Symptoms do not normally suddenly present, so this should be a rare occurrence. 3. If the pupil starts to cough in lesson they should be advised initially to have a cool drink. 4. If pupil attends class with the above COVID-19 symptoms, remove the pupil from the class. Contact Sickbay as above. Pupils if instructed to attend Sickbay or House must wear a face covering and hand sanitise. They are to go directly to the designated area. SICKBAY have their own guidance on dealing with a suspected case **NIGHTTIME (After 10.30)** 1. In House: If the above symptoms develop overnight contact Sickbay on 01691 626 529 or mobile 07531801558 for advice and further instructions. 2. The member of staff should wear a mask and maintain 2 metres social distancing. Do not go into the bedroom. 3. Ask the student to ventilate the room by opening the windows. 4. If in a shared room, do not remove their roommate, as they may need to self-isolate. 5. If the pupil is poorly and needs to relocate to Sickbay, ask them to pack a small bag of personal items/clothing, wear a face covering and hand sanitise. 6. The roommate will need to self-isolate, even if asymptomatic until the diagnosis is confirmed. 7. Remember symptoms should not suddenly appear. Children cough for other reasons. There is no need to self-isolate anyone else in the House. This will only happen on advice from Public Health.

Appendix 4	NHS Main Symptoms of Coronavirus (COVID 19)
	The NHS has an online symptom checker, which is what sickbay are using if there is any thought that it is Covid-19. Main symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) - NHS (www.nhs.uk)
	The symptom checker is for the general public to use, so there is no harm in you using it. This may help to reassure, one way or the other. This is not an attempt to miss out sickbay, but they may not be able to act immediately, if they are in high demand. If the outcome of the NHS symptom checker is to self-isolate then keep them in House and let sickbay know.
	If a boarder does test positive for Covid-19, they will need to isolate. Staff will be allowed to go into House as necessary. In addition, all students (e.g. from lessons) who had been within 2m of the student will need to test in line with Test and Trace protocols. We would then arrange for all meals to be taken to House. This would work in a similar way to how we managed the quarantine period. Any pupils in self-isolation can return home to isolate with their parents.
	If a day pupil was to have symptoms, there would be no immediate action, other than them going home and the parents arranging a test. If this test proves positive, then we would follow Test and Trace protocols.
	If a boarder is ill, but not with Covid symptoms, then they should remain in House. These pupils can go to the dining hall towards the end of the serving times and just keep away from others. If they are ill and would normally go to sickbay, then they should.
