Covid-19 is an illness that can affect your lungs and airways. The virus is now known as the severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2). The disease it causes is called coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19). In March 2020, the World Health Organization (WHO) declared the COVID-19 outbreak a pandemic. Data has shown that it spreads from person to person among those in close contact (within about 6 feet, or 2 meters). The virus spreads by respiratory droplets released when someone with the virus coughs, sneezes or talks. These droplets can be inhaled or land in the mouth or nose of a person nearby.

It can also spread if a person touches a surface with the virus on it and then touches his or her mouth, nose or eyes, although this isn't considered to be a main way it spreads.

Symptoms can be mild, moderate, severe, or fatal. The risk to children themselves of becoming severely ill from coronavirus (COVID-19) is very low. In addition, there is no evidence that children transmit the disease any more than adults.

We are aware of this disease and are vigilant as to any of our pupils, staff, volunteers or visitors displaying symptoms.

This risk assessment was prepared on the 30th August 2020 in line with government guidelines for the re-start of schools in September and is applicable to private schools, and will be an on-going assessment as and when there are changes to Covid-19 Government guidelines.

maintaining social distancing	 Pupils and staff are separated into groups (or 'bubbles'). These are based on Year groups for KS3 and above. KS2 will be their own bubble, as will the Sixth Form. After the end of the school day, bubbles should be maintained as far as possible, but Saints Houses will also need to be a bubble. 2m spacings should be maintained between Year groups in House wherever possible. Face coverings to be worn in all communal areas for year 7 and above. Most bubbles are in Year groups and pupils do not mix with those outside of their bubble during the normal school day. Within 'Bubbles' the aim is still to maintain some form of social distancing. Time spent within 1m of anyone should be minimised and face to face contact avoided. It is recognised that this will be more difficult with KS2, but remains an aim. Face coverings to be worn in all communal areas for year 7 and above. Staff can move between bubbles, but must minimise close contact with others whilst doing so. Staff maintain a two-metre distance from each other and from pupils, where possible. Where maintaining a two-metre distance is not possible, staff avoid close face-to-face contact and minimise the time spent within one metre of anyone. Face coverings are to be worn in these instances. In order to avoid large gatherings, Assemblies will be in Tutor groups, via TEAMS. Outside spaces are to be designated for use by different bubbles at particular times. Use of facilities after school are to be designated for use by different bubbles at particular times. 	 In line with current government guidance, face coverings are now required to be worn in the classroom, for year 7 and above. Each teaching area has their own risk assessment. If 2 m spacings can be maintained, then masks may be removed. Some individuals are exempt from wearing face coverings. This applies to those who cannot put on, wear or remove a face covering because of a physical or mental illness or impairment or disability All pupils, staff, volunteers and visitors should provide their own face covering but, where they are unable to use their face covering due to having forgotten it or it having become soiled or unsafe, a small contingency supply will be available. These can be found in Houses, Main reception and Lower School reception. Safe wearing of face coverings requires cleaning of hands before and after touching – including to remove or put them on – and the safe storage of them in individual, sealable plastic bags between use. Where a face covering becomes damp, it should not be worn and the face covering should be replaced carefully. You should not touch the front of your face covering during use or when removing it and you must dispose of temporary face coverings in a 'black bag' waste bin (not recycling bin) or place reusable face coverings in a plastic bag for their next use. Face coverings should not be extreme in style or offensive. 			
Hand cleaning and respiratory hygiene	 Hand washing or sanitising stations are set up in every classroom, providing soap and water, bins and/or alcohol-based hand sanitiser. Hand washing stations are set up outside Lower School and New Block, providing soap and water. Adequate amounts of soap, drying facilities and bins are available in the relevant areas. Pupils and staff are encouraged to wash their hands regularly, including when they arrive at school, when they return from breaks, when they change rooms, and before and after eating. Pupils are supervised, where appropriate, when using hand sanitiser to ensure they do not ingest any. 	• PPE is to be worn by supervising staff if direct personal care is needed and they cannot

	• Anyone who comes into contact with an unwell individual will wash their hands

Used PPE is disposed of properly using bins provided around the school. Staff and pupils are told not to use recycling bins for disposing of ordinary waste. All PPE waste (used for close contact / suspected Covid-19 case) is put in a plastic rubbish bag which, once full, is tied and placed in a second tied bag. It is then put in the usual waste area. Confirmed cases of coronavirus	Where an individual in the school community tests positive for coronavirus, the Headmaster (or his Deputy) contacts the new service which has been introduced by Public Health England (PHE) and is delivered by the NHS Business Services Authority, working to agreed PHE and DfE guidance. It can be reached by calling the DfE's existing coronavirus helpline number on 0800 046 8687, and selecting option 1. The school works with the new service to manage the response. The new advice service has been introduced following a significant increase in calls to PHE's Health Protection Teams since the start of the new school term. The new service, working together with Health Protection Teams, aims to ensure calls are handled promptly. The advice service will be open Monday to Friday from 8am to 6pm and 10am to 4pm on Saturdays and Sundays. If required, all parents and staff are informed of the confirmed case; however, the name of the individual is not shared. Confirmed cases or those being tested will be isolated in Sickbay. All meals will be delivered to Sickbay. Appendix 3	Staff Guidance on dealing with a suspected COVID-19 case at Ellesmere College
	Main COVID-19 Symptoms
	 A prolonged (up to an hour) persistent, new cough occurring at least three times in past 24 hrs
	A high temperature above 37.8'C
	A loss or change in your sense of smell or taste (anosmia)
	DAYTIME
	 In House: Isolate pupil in their room, making sure no roommates are present. Ring Sickbay on 01691 626 529 or mobile 07531 801 558 for advice and further instructions. You can also go on the NHS has an online symptom checker, https://111.nhs.uk/covid-19/
	2. In Class: Symptoms do not normally suddenly present, so this should be a rare occurrence.
	3. If the pupil starts to cough in lesson they should be advised initially to have a cool drink.
	4. If pupil attends class with the above COVID-19 symptoms, remove the pupil from the class. Contact Sickbay as above.
	Pupils if instructed to attend Sickbay or House must wear a face covering and hand sanitise. They are to go directly to
	the designated area.
	SICKBAY have their own guidance on dealing with a suspected case
	NIGHTTIME (After 10.30)
	 In House: If the above symptoms develop overnight contact Sickbay on 01691 626 529 or mobile 07531801558 for advice and further instructions.
	2. The member of staff should wear a mask and maintain 2 metres social distancing. Do not go into the bedroom.
	3. Ask the student to ventilate the room by opening the windows.
	4. If in a shared room, do not remove their roommate, as they may need to self-isolate.
	5. If the pupil is poorly and needs to relocate to Sickbay, ask them to pack a small bag of personal items/clothing, wear a face covering and hand sanitise.
	6. The roommate will need to self-isolate, even if asymptomatic until the diagnosis is confirmed.
	7. Remember symptoms should not suddenly appear. Children cough for other reasons.
	There is no need to self-isolate anyone else in the House. This will only happen on advice from Public Health.

Appendix 4	NHS Online Symptom Checker
	The NHS has an online symptom checker, which is what sickbay are using if there is any thought that it is Covid-19. https://111.nhs.uk/covid-19/
	The symptom checker is for the general public to use, so there is no harm in you using it. This may help to reassure, one way or the other. This is not an attempt to miss out sickbay, but they may not be able to act immediately, if they are in high demand. If the outcome of the NHS symptom checker is to self-isolate then keep them in House and let sickbay know. We will inform public health and they will tell us the next step. It is not necessary for the bubble to isolate immediately, but public health may choose this option.
	If a boarder does test positive for Covid-19, again public health will be contacted. The likely outcome of this is that the House bubble will need to self-isolate. However, staff are not part of this bubble and will not need to self-isolate . Staff will be allowed to go into House as necessary. In addition, all students (e.g. from lessons) who had been within 2m of the student would have to self-isolate. We would then arrange for all meals to be taken to House. This would work in a similar way to how we managed the quarantine period. Any pupils in self-isolation can return home to isolate with their parents. Should someone develop COVID-19 symptoms late in the 10-day household isolation period the isolation period for the rest of the household does not need to be extended.
	If a day pupil was to have symptoms, there would be no immediate action, other than them going home and the parents arranging a test. If this test proves positive, then all students who had been within 2m of the student would have to self-isolate.
	If a boarder is ill, but not with Covid symptoms, then they should remain in House. These pupils can go to the dining hall towards the end of the serving times and just keep away from others. If they are ill and would normally go to sickbay, then they should.
